Spring Thaw Scout Camp

**A FUN/competition camp
for all Scout Troops**

Registration meeting

First held in 1987, **Spring Thaw** is held on the first full weekend of June each year. This Camp is designed so that Troops may compete in the activities or do them just for fun and experience. Activities vary each year as they are selected and organized by those Scouters attending. Each activity is organized in such a fashion that points may be awarded, leading to an **event trophy** and/or the **OVERALL CAMP AWARD**.

Since you can drive right up to the camping area, equipment does not become a problem. No backpacking or lightweight equipment is required!

Coming at the end of the scouting year, it is a perfect camp to bring those Cubs who may be thinking of joining the Scout Troop in the fall. The availability of open fires (given no fire bans) also offers a different type of setting. This allows you the opportunity to let the Scouts practice fire building and cooking over an open flame. Fire pits are available; each pit is a washer drum on legs.

Sounds similar to other Scout Camps? Well, there are a few differences; the Camp starts on Friday night with the **Opening** and **Formal Campfire**, including lights and a stage. **Program activities** start at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday. This allows time for final setup of the events. Scouts can help setup, work on their campsites, build gadgets, do badge work or just have free time.

Some of the activities held in the past have included Archery, Air Rifles, Cooking, Pioneering, First Aid, Orienteering, Backwoods Cooking and Survival Skills to name just a few.

After supper on Saturday evening, each patrol is supplied with Carnival Cash and a **Carnival** is hosted by the Venturers. This is followed by an **Auction** where patrols bid on different items, such as sports and camping equipment, games, candy, clothing and any other donations we have received including sealed Mystery Boxes. Payment is in Carnival Cash and ownership goes to the highest bidder (or sometimes to the first bidder!). Scouts then have free time to hold their own campfires at their campsites or visit with other patrols from all over the province.

There are three events on Sunday, the **Obstacle Course**, **Scouts Own** and the **Patrol Challenge Events** (known as the "**Fields of Strength**"). These challenges vary in precise content from year to year.

Unique to the camp is a **newsletter** called **The SCRIBE**. Published once before camp and four times during the camp, it brings news of the camp and its activities, as well as the final results of the different competitions. Daily event schedules and who is in camp are regular features in **The SCRIBE**.

The theme for **Spring Thaw 2018**, the 32nd annual edition of this camp, will be centered on a theme involving the Star Trek Universe and will be entitled

Scout Trek The Wrath of Gator

Some of the activities will be geared around the camp theme and a surprise or three may even be possible.

As usual, the activities will require both individual and patrol efforts. Be prepared to work together to accomplish the tasks.

David Thompson Award

Also held in connection with the camp is the **DAVID THOMPSON AWARD**.

Its requirements will vary year to year, but they are designed to accommodate different skills and involve the Scouts both before and at camp.

These “skills” may include intellectual (research and a written presentation), dexterity (building something before camp) and hands on (doing something at camp – performing at campfire, cooking or making a drink, or beautification of the camp area).

Each member of the winning patrol receives a “**David Thompson Award Crest**” available only at Spring Thaw!

CAMP RULES

1. NO open fires allowed except in metal fire pits (depending on the current Fire Hazard Rating).
2. NO cutting of any live Pine and Spruce trees.
3. Pack it in, pack it out! All garbage is to be taken home with you.
4. No pets allowed to come to camp, live ones that is, stuffed are fine.
5. If leaving camp for any reason, report to H.Q. first.
6. Axes are to be used with great respect at all times.
7. To wear a knife is a Scouting privilege, so use it with respect.
8. No power equipment to be used in camp after 10:00 a.m. on Saturday unless approved by the Camp Chief.
9. The **Scout Law** is the law of the camp.
